Jan Novák is a leading Czech writer and documentary maker. In the years 1970-2008, he lived in Chicago, where he attended the University of Chicago and where his books The Willys Dream Kit (1985) and Commies, Crooks, Gypsies, Spooks É Poets (1995) won the Carl Sandburg Prize for Chicago's book of the year. He also co-authored The Turnaround (1994). Miloš Forman's autobioaraphu. Novák is now resident once more in the Czech Republic. His novel So Far, So Good was the Magnesia Litera Awards Book of the Year 2005, and in 2020 he published a controversial literary biography, entitled Kundera, His Czech Life and Times. Zátopek is his debut work in the field of graphic novels.



Jaromír 99, whose real name is Jaromír Švejdík, divides his time between the worlds of music and comics. He is well-known as a member of the groups Priessnitz and Umakart, and as the artist behind the *Alois Nebel* (2003) trilogy. He also worked as a co-screenwriter and artist on its film adaptation (2011), which was awarded Best Animated Film by the European Film Academy. He won a Muriel Award for his comic strip *Bomber* (2007) and he adapted Kafka's *The Castle* (2013) as a graphic novel for SelfMadeHero, which was nominated for the prestigious Eisner Award. Jaromír 99 lives and works in Prague.



Perhaps the greatest Olympic champion of all time, Emil Zátopek became a national hero for his prowess at running. Known as the "Czech Locomotive", the outspoken Zátopek was equally impressive as a public figure, successfully pressuring Czechoslovakia's Communist regime to allow his colleague Stanislav Jungwirth, a political outcast, to compete. But as the 1952 Helsinki Olympic Games approached, Zátopek's fate hung in the balance: would he be crushed by the government he had challenged, or go on to claim international glory? The outcome would be decided by three spectacular races: the 5,000 metres, the 10,000 metres and the marathon.

A powerful biographical portrait set against the backdrop of the Cold War, *Zátopek* sees Czech creators Jan Novák and Jaromír 99 explore the extraordinary career of a peerless distance runner, from his first meeting with his wife, fellow Olympian Dana Ingrová, to the record-breaking victories that would ensure his lasting legacy.
