


# Zátopek

Their journey, still fiercely debated today, is a tale of moral conviction, brutal choices, and survival against the odds.

**Jan Novák** is a leading Czech writer and documentary filmmaker, a recipient of the major literary prizes like Carl Sandburg Literary Award or Magnesia Litera. With Jaromír 99, he co-created three acclaimed graphic novels. Their first two works, Zátopek and So Far So Good, have been translated into six languages. Their third graphic novel is Čáslavská.

**Jaromír 99** (Jaromír Švejdík) is a Czech comics artist and musician. He's best known for the graphic novel Alois Nebel, which was adapted into an animated film. His signature black-and-white style is his trademark.

#### Plot summary of Zátopek

### Emil Zátopek: The Legend Who Conquered Helsinki and Changed the World of Running

The document, titled "zatopek\_2016-book\_final.pdf," is an illustrated comic-book adaptation of the life story and career of one of the greatest athletes of all time, the Czechoslovak runner Emil Zátopek (1922-1987). The narrative details his journey from humble beginnings to his unprecedented Olympic triumphs and his unforgettable influence on the world of track and field.

#### The Birth of a Running Phenomenon

Emil Zátopek was born in Kopřivnice and began his professional career at the age of fifteen as an apprentice at the Baťa Škoda Works in Zlín. He essentially came to running by accident when, in 1941, he was forced to participate in the "Run Through Zlín" race.

A key turning point in his career was meeting Dr. Jan Haluza, his only coach. With Haluza's support, Zátopek developed a revolutionary and, at the time, unorthodox interval training method. His philosophy was that intense short bursts (e.g., ten repetitions of 200 meters at full speed) were more effective for developing speed and endurance than continuous long runs. This grueling method earned him the nickname "The Czech Locomotive." Although Zátopek was forced to part ways with Haluza after the 1948 communist coup (due to the coach's political inconvenience), he kept the training methodology.

#### First Victory and a Fateful Meeting in London (1948)

At the 1948 London Olympic Games, Zátopek won his first Olympic gold medal in the 10,000 m event, setting a new Olympic record and claiming Czechoslovakia's first track and field gold. He also added a silver medal in the 5,000 m race.

During the Games, he met javelin thrower Dana Ingrová, with whom he shared not only a love for sport but also the exact same birthday (September 19, 1922). Despite initial resistance

from Dana's family, they soon married. In the time between the Olympics, both Zátopek and his wife continually pushed boundaries, with Emil breaking the world record for the 10,000 m three times.

#### Helsinki 1952: The Immortal Golden Triple

The peak of Zátopek's career came at the 1952 Helsinki Olympic Games, an event that is indelibly marked in sports history.


Standing Up to the Regime: Before flying to Finland, Zátopek fearlessly confronted Communist Party officials. He demanded the inclusion of his friend and protégé, Stanislav Jungwirth, whose father was a political prisoner. Zátopek declared that he would not fly without Jungwirth and ultimately succeeded in his threat.


The Golden Medal Streak: In Helsinki, Emil Zátopek achieved a completely unique feat that no one has replicated before or since. He won three gold medals in a single Olympiad: 10,000 m

The Marathon (which he was running for the very first time in his life)

His great triumph was completed by his wife, Dana Zátopková, who also won gold in the Javelin Throw in Helsinki, bringing the couple's Olympic gold tally to four. Zátopek's performances in 1952 cemented him as a global sports icon and a symbol of unbreakable will.

## Zatím dobrý" (So Far So Good): A Graphic Novel Chronicle of the Cold War's Biggest Escape

The book details the exhausting and bloody battle for every inch of freedom. While some members managed to fight their way through to West Berlin, where they later

joined the U.S. Army, two—Zbyněk Janata and Václav Švéda—were captured and subsequently executed.

The Family's Fate and a Historical Reminder

The authors don't just focus on the action; they also respectfully highlight the tragic toll the resistance took on the family. The graphic novel clearly maps out the persecution faced by the brothers' mother, Zdena Mašínová, who was imprisoned and ultimately died in jail. Their uncle, Ctibor Novák, was also executed.

Ultimately, *Zatím dobrý* isn't just an adventurous war story. It's a comprehensive historical reminder that uses visually stunning comic book language to open up one of the most controversial and important chapters in modern Czech history. The book wraps up with short biographies of both the survivors and those who were executed, giving the powerful story a final, documentary feel.
